
New Wyman Park Dell Playground Embraces Nature

Since the completion in 2009 of the master plan for Wyman Park Dell, one of Baltimore's historic Olmsted Brothers parks, we have fortunately witnessed the implementation of many of the plan's recommendations.

Most notable are the replacement of the crumbling stone wall around the perimeter of the lower Dell with new dry-stack stone wall and the removal of the 29th Street sweep, which expanded the park significantly to include the little used triangle of green space. Thanks for these capital projects goes to the Departments of Recreation and Parks, and Transportation. Friends of Wyman Park Dell (FWPD) and volunteer partners, most notably the Beta fraternity from JHU, the JHU Baseball Team and Serve Greater Baltimore, accomplished the following:

- Planted and maintained over 30 native trees
- Repaired and painted the maintenance building
- Removed overgrowth along Charles Street to make the park more visible
- Removed many invasive plants
 Co-ordinated 10–12 annual park cleanups and work projects

FWPD also expanded programming in the park to include Winter Solstice celebrations, a Summer Solstice gathering *Dell Playground, continued on page 8*

Community Partnership Transforms Barclay Recreation Center on 29th Street

Greater Homewood Community Corporation (GHCC), the administrator of the Barclay Community School, has taken the lead in partnering with local neighborhood and recreation leaders, Barclay School, and Baltimore City Public Schools system to transform the Barclay Recreation Center (attached to Barclay School on 29th Street) into a major community asset in north central Baltimore. With the support of community partners, GHCC hopes to develop programming that will transform the space into a fully-operational, sustainable community center.

The Barclay School envisions that the additional space provided through access to Barclay Rec Center will permit the expansion and diversification of afterschool offerings and create supplemental space for physical education as well as handson learning to support its project-based learning focus, including its greening projects. Barclay School is a Maryland Governor's Green School. By engaging and organizing the community to bring new life and vibrancy into this center, we plan to transform the center into a significant community asset that will attract more families to the neighborhood.

The neighborhoods and organizations surrounding the school see the Barclay Center as a great potential asset to provide opportunities for residents of all ages (children through seniors), and neighborhood organizations with space and activities to help grow their community.

A Community Center Council (the Council), comprised of representatives from each community, institution and age group in the area was formed in July 2011 to help create a vision for what the Barclay Rec Center could become. This Council will also help implement a business model that includes fee-for-service, free and school programming to meet the diverse needs and desires of the school, its students, and neighborhood residents. \

John Spurrier, retiring Charles Village Festival Vendor Coordinator

CVCA extends its most sincere thanks to John Spurrier for many years of organizing the vendors at the Charles Village Festival. John has always shown an amazing creativity in finding unique additions to the Festival, including the Oscar Mayer Wienermobile, and the Geico Gecko. More importantly, he established a lasting rapport with the food, craft, and commercial vendors that makes them come back to the Charles Village Festival year after year. John and his wife Odette welcomed baby Theresa on May 18 just in time for her to debut at the Festival.

Major Sabrina Tapp-Harper, Commander, Northern District, Baltimore City Police Department

Since her appointment onJune 15, 2011 as Commanding Officer of the Northern District, Major Tapp-Harper has worked closely with the CVCA Safety Committee to address resident concerns by responding personally to emails requesting assistance and information and by ensuring the presence of police officers at community meetings. The Major has been a strong advocate downtown for extra police patrols and Vice Stings in Charles Village trouble spots. She has made a commitment to make more arrests in certain areas plagued by disturbance from prostitution and has delivered on that commitment. In April, the Major was selected by President Obama as the administration's Law Enforcement Representative to participate in a workshop aimed at reauthorizing the Violence Against Women Act. CVCA honors Major Tapp-Harper's hard work and continuing strong leadership as the Northern District Commander.

Evalyn Tyson, West Charles Village Leader and Positive Force

Resident of West 27th Street since 1999, Evalyn Tyson found time to actively participate in the area west of Charles Street. As a block leader, Evalyn participated in the CVCBD Block Captain Training, welcomed new residents to her block, and distributed CVCBD and CVCA flyers and notices to her block and adjoining blocks. She arranged with the City for paving a small offshoot of Morton Street Alley, the repaving of the block's sidewalks and for planting new trees in empty tree wells. Known as the "Police Chief of 27th Street" by her neighbors, Evalyn patrols the blocks and alleys, picks up trash, advises residents of proper trash rules, recycling and trash pickup days, takes plastic bags out of City trees and reports graffiti. S he also started new neighborhood gardens and assisted in the beautification of gardens around Charles Village West. Evalyn will continue to be a positive force in West Charles Village.

CVCBD Launches Targeted Security Patrol Program in September

CVCBD will operate a Targeted Security Patrol Program in the fall. The program involves employing the services of armed off-duty police with arrest powers, who will patrol targeted areas at targeted times and days of the week. The officers will patrol for a total of 2,160 hours during a 10-month period. Deployment will vary continually according to criminal activity.

The CVCBD will contract with BWI Management to identify off-duty policemen to patrol the Benefits District at specified times and to provide the requisite number of officers per shift. The CVCBD will provide officers with CVCBD identifiers, helmets, gloves and a Trikke Electric Vehicle that is specifically designed for community security programs. The CVCBD Safety Coordinator in cooperation with the Northern District and BWI will determine daily the targeted areas. The days and times will be set weekly depending on recent criminal activity.

The Targeted Security Patrol Program goals include:

- Improve public safety by discouraging prostitution, drug distribution, loitering and related crimes, robberies, assaults, burglaries, larceny and other crimes
- Assist police in apprehending suspects when they commit crimes
- Increase cooperation between the CVCBD, Northern District Police and Johns Hopkins University
- Promote a sense of security and well-being among residents

If successful with measurable and meaningful outcomes, the CVCBD will continue and expand the program as funds become available.





VLP Learning Garden Certified Bay-Wise

For years, a dedicated group of volunteers has spent their Sunday mornings watering, weeding, planting, and bringing life to the walled garden surrounding the Village Learning Place. The garden has become more beautiful each year and the volunteers have achieved their long-term goal to create a green and environmentally responsible space for community members to enjoy. Recently, their sustained work was recognized when the VLP Learning Garden was officially named a Maryland Bay-Wise Garden!

The Maryland Bay-Wise Program focuses primarily on ensuring healthy water quality in an effort to preserve the Chesapeake Bay. To become Bay-Wise certified, a garden must meet certain criteria outlined by the Bay-Wise Maryland Yardstick. A Bay-Wise homeowner/garden owner is generally defined as someone who does the following:

- ► Fertilizes Wisely
- ► Waters Efficiently and Mows Properly
- Controls Stormwater Runoff
- Mulches Appropriately
- ► Recycles Yard Waste
- ► Manages Pests with safe Pest Management
- ► Plants Wisely
- ► Encourages Wildlife
- ▶ Protects the Waterfront

On May 5, members of the VLP's Garden Committee as well as three Baltimore City Master Gardeners toured the garden and met to discuss the garden's ranking on the Bay-Wise Maryland Yardstick. The garden more than exceeded the requirements needed to make it an official certified Bay-Wise garden— a great honor for the VLP.

The VLP as an organization will continue to become more sustainable and ecofriendly. VLP staff and the Garden Committee are currently discussing ways to continue to beautify the garden while making it even more environmentally sound.



Johns Hopkins University, one of the neighborhood stakeholders, made a commitment to assist the project by providing an overview evaluation of the facility's physical plant and support from the Carey Business School. Carey will develop a feasibility study and business plan to assess the space and ensure that a new community center can sustain itself from fee-for-service income within three years. The university will also look at opportunities to increase engagement at the center and the Barclay School through volunteer activities by students and other JHU affiliates.

We plan to create a revenue stream from fee-for-service activities to cover operational expenses and programming at an affordable rate to low-income families and youth in the form of scholarships. GHCC will lead a fundraising effort to identify additional funds to help cover the costs of a coordinator, programming and some initial renovation expenses.

Implementation begins in September and will develop in stages, with the new Barclay Community Center reaching full capacity by July of 2015. At this point in our planning, we expect a Community Center Coordinator, who will be responsible to the Council under the auspices of GHCC, to manage the day-to-day operations of the Barclay Center. The hiring of the Community Center Coordinator will be supported in part by a cash contribution from Johns Hopkins University. The Council anticipates implementing an organizational structure modeled to some extent on Baltimore County Recreation Centers, where a community culture of volunteers has helped build those centers into thriving resources.

Baltimore City Department of Recreation and Parks will transfer control of the Barclay Recreation Center to the Baltimore City Public Schools in the weeks ahead. Volunteer clean-up days are now being organized. "We are very excited about the transition of the center to the Barclay School," said Karen Stokes, GHCC Executive Director. "With the enthusiasm of our community and institutional partners, and



the early funding and in-kind commitment that we have received from the Johns Hopkins University, we are confident that this process will result in the transformation of Barclay Rec into a wonderful asset for Charles Village and its nearby neighborhoods."

As part of the business plan, we are looking for input from ALL residents of the communities surrounding the Barclay center and want to hear from you!

and The Big Draw family event in October. See announcement on page 9.

In addition, the Friends of Wyman Park Dell, in partnership with the Department of Recreation and Parks, embarked on designing and constructing a new playground,— one of the recommendations of the master plan. The new and expanded playground will include an initial phase which should be under construction before the end of 2012, and future phases, which requires a Friends fundraising campaign. FWPD retained Mahan Rykiel Associates to prepare the playground design and to coordinate construction drawings with the Department of Recreation and Parks. Mahan Rykiel is donating 50 percent of their time for this effort.

The design for the playground area and, ultimately, the entire plateau area surrounding the Union Soldiers and Sailors Monument evolved out of two community workshops in October 2011 and February 2012. The workshops attracted participants from Charles Village, Remington, Waverly, Hampden and Wyman Park. At the February workshop families and children offered important input, such as the desire that a portion of the playground and plateau area include opportunities for nature-based play.

Each workshop included a presentation by Mahan Rykiel, followed by a placemaking workshop at the Union Soldiers and Sailors Monument Plateau and playground area where ideas and visions were discussed. Two significant workshop outcomes include *Ping Pong in the Park*, an informal programming activity made possible by participant Rolando Demen's donation of a portable ping pong table. During this summer Rolando organized the ping pong events several times a week. He also volunteered his Air Force squadron to help FWPD improve the existing nature paths in the woodland slope near the playground. The improved paths will reinforce the highly popular workshop goal for more nature-based play and activities in the park.

The initial construction phase focuses on the same area of the existing playground and will be ADA compliant. The ground level of the new playground will be lowered several feet lower to match the adjacent walkway grade and will allow for future interpretive storm water management in the form of a bio-swale. The first phase of construction will include a rubber safety surface, new swings, a multi-purpose play structure and the reuse of one of the spring horses. Future

JOPPA RD, SUITE 305 TOWSON, MARYLAND 21286 WWW.DAVIDNOWAKLAW.COM construction calls for expansion of the playground with the bio-swale and will include an ornamental fence enclosure, an expanded play surface with additional play equipment, picnic tables, signage and ornamental plantings. An 18-inch stone retaining wall on the eastern edge of the playground will also serve as a seat wall for parents.

Currently, Mahan Rykiel is working with the Department of Recreation and Parks who is preparing the final construction drawings for Phase I of the playground. They will then complete refinements to the illustrative drawings to aid fundraising efforts toward implementing future phases. — Tom McGilloway, Principal, Mahan Rykiel Associates and Board Member, Friends of Wyman Park Dell

Waverly Main Street Submits Nomination for National Register of Historic Places

Waverly Main Street submitted a nomination for the area along Greenmount Avenue between 29th and 35th and commercial sections of adjacent side streets, including 33rd from Barclay to Old York, to be added to the Historic Register of Historic Places.

The Baltimore City Commission on Historical and Architectural Preservation (CHAP) will review the nomination at a Public Hearing on October 9, 1:30 p.m. at Baltimore City Department of Planning, 8th Floor, 417 East Fayette Street.

The Maryland Historical Trust (MHT) will hold a public hearing for the nomination on Tuesday, October 16. If the State Review Board certifies the proposal, the nomination then moves to the U.S. Department of the Interior National Park Service for their determination. The following is extracted from the nomination report. Preservation Maryland provided a grant to help fund this project.

Waverly's Period of Significance

In 1741, York Road passed through Waverly and acted as a major trade connection between Baltimore and Pennsylvania. This trade route contributed not only to the development of Waverly but also Baltimore and other cities along the trade route such as Towson and York. 1808 marks the beginning of the construction of the actual road that would become York Road and Greenmount Avenue. This road is the center of the community and provided impetus for the development of a community and commercial area. The hamlet of Waverly, the first official community in present-day Waverly, was established in 1830. An Episcopalian congregation was organized in Waverly in 1843. Lizette Woodworth Reese, a significant cultural figure was born in 1856 and lived in Waverly throughout her productive life.

In 1870, the York Turnpike Railway Company was beginning to modernize transportation along York

Road by installing a train track. This helped speed transportation between Baltimore and neighboring cities, enhancing commerce and development throughout the area. Another transportation revolution came in 1893, when people began using electric cars on York Road, necessitating paving the road and bringing the turnpike into the modern age.

The village was officially named *Waverly* in 1888, after years of being referred to as *Huntington*.


Sseveral community projects were completed that would have had a significant impact on the community. Planned by Frederick Law Olmsted Jr., the tree -lined 33rd Street boulevard was completed in 1919 and remains one of the best examples of parkway planning in the city.

Renovations of the Waverly Theatre were completed and the theatre reopened in 1921. The theatre would be a community mainstay for 50 years and attract business and visitors to the area. In 1922, Venable Stadium opened on 33rd Street. After World War II, Memorial Stadium replaced the original football stadium to suit both baseball and football and boosted Waverly as a commercial destination.

Published in 1940, the *Waverly: A Study in Neighborhood Conservation* study was one of the country's first conservation efforts and *The Baltimore Plan*, as eventually renamed, is still used by housing officials during revitalization plan development.

Register Online after September 20 for RPP Area 12 Charles Village & Abell 12A Permits. After October 20, You MUST Go Downtown to City's Parking Authority Office to pick up your permit.

Residents of Charles Village in the Residential Permit Parking (RPP) Area 12 (north of 29th Street, west of Hunter Street/alley) and 12A-Abell (north of 29th Street, east of Hunter Street/alley) must register and purchase their annual parking permits and visitors passes.

All current permits expire October 31. You must show proof of residency to ensure that participation in the program is limited to *residents only*. To be eligible for a Parking Permit and/or Visitors Pass, you must reside within the boundaries of the RPP area. Warning— A parking citation (fine) for not displaying a current RPP decal or visitor's pass in Area 12/12A is \$52 for each occurrence.

Required Documentation for RPP Registration You must bring all current documentation when picking up your permits at either the Community Pick Up on October 20 or at the Parking Authority. What you will need to provide for a permit: Current Maryland Vehicle Registration (Area 12/12A address is required unless ► you have a Maryland registration and are a full-time student with a current Student ID) One form of Proof of Residency, such as: a. Current Lease signed by all parties that is not month to month (month to month leases require residents to come to the PABC office each month to renew permit) b. Proof of home ownership (settlement papers) c. Current driver's license that reflects your current address d. Utility bill in your name, reflecting current address, that is no less than 30 days old e. Vehicle registration that reflects current RPP address Any Photo ID In addition to the above, you may need more documentation: If vehicle is registered out of state in your name: You must switch your vehicle over to Maryland before being permitted to purchase a Parking Permit Decal, unless you are a full-time student or a member of the military. Out-of-state students and military must purchase and present a Non-Resident Permit from the MVA before a permit/decal is released. The Non-Resident Permit or receipt for its purchase from MVA for the permit must be displayed to the Parking Authority or at your Community Pick-Up for the permit to be released. If vehicle registration is out of state but in someone else's name: A current notarized letter is required each and every time you renew. The letter must be dated/signed no more than 6 months from the day of acquiring your permit. A Maryland Driver's License reflecting current address must be presented. If you don't have a Maryland Driver's License you are required to acquire a nonres permit. Current vehicle registration

If vehicle is in state but registered in someone else's name:

► A current notarized letter from the vehicles owner granting you rights to drive this vehicle is required each and every time you renew. The letter must be dated/signed no more than 6 months from the day of acquiring your permit. If you currently have a parking permit, you are already in the City's RPP database and you do not have to re-enter your information. Use the same user name and password that you used last year. If you forgot your user name and/or password, call the Parking Authority at 443.573.2800 and staff will help you to do a password reset.

If this is your FIRST TIME applying for a parking permit, you MUST go downtown to the Parking Authority office at 200 W. Lombard Street, Suite B to apply for and pick up your parking permit in person. The Parking Authority will provide you with validation to park for free in the garage above their office.


