CV Designers Lead Citywide Urban Forest Project



Baltimore: The Urban Forest Project will showcase 200 artists, designers and students for two months. Beginning April 11, banners will line Charles and Pratt Streets, leading to six city parks. In Charles Village, banners will also hang in Wyman Park Dell during the Charles Village Festival on May 31 & June 1, when the lower Dell becomes an installation site. The Urban Forest Project (UFP) is a unique design exhibition that will raise Baltimore's profile nationally, bring many communities together, show easy ways to be green, and raise money for the Mayor Sheila Dixon's TreeBaltimore initiative.

The UFP showcases Baltimore's creative talent. Over 250 Baltimore K-12 students, Girl Scouts, 100 area businesses, and 200 designers, local college students, and artists have designed banners that will be displayed on posts throughout Baltimore city this spring for 11 weeks beginning April 11–June 27. Based on the image of a tree and the idea of sustainability, these banners become an urban forest and tell a visual story.

Banners will line Charles and Pratt Streets leading visitors to six city parks. Druid Hill Park, Herring Run Park and Clifton Run Park will display banners from children at Park School, Lab School Baltimore, Edmonson West-Side High School and Mt. Washington Elementary. The remaining banners will be displayed throughout the city and will lead to Wyman Park Dell, Carroll Park and Patterson Park. These parks will feature creative installations by three area design firms demonstrating their own interpretation of sustainability (Cut Farm and 4thought, Gensler & Fast Spot). Daylong special events featuring entertainment, food and green education will promote and drive traffic to the parks.

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President's Letter

Philip & James Church to participate in CVCA's Community Potluck Social and General Membership Meeting. Increasing attendance at CVCA meetings was one of the goals. I hoped to achieve during my tenure as president. Seeing such a large, enthusiastic and engaged crowd at the January meeting was beyond swell! Watching this large group interact with one another, sharing recipes for their homemade dishes, engaging in an impromptu chili contest and just enjoying one another was warming. Hoping for a repeat at the March 26 General Meeting (see box on page 1), we will repeat the Community Potluck Social and also, bring you information regarding the reinvigorated Charles Village Walkers groups, facts to support assessment appeals and ideas for finding jobs for all Charles Village youngsters. We promise to get you out by 9 p.m.

In addition to the socializing, passing the CVCA By-Laws, learning about single-stream recycling, the January group gathered to go about the very serious business of learning about Maryland's process for assessing real estate and appealing those assessments. This brings me to the second thing I never thought I'd see in Charles Village-property assessments through the proverbial roof and in some instances, 300 percent higher than the previous assessment. Many shared the shock. Panelists Owen Charles, SDAT and a former SS. Philip & James parishioner, Councilwoman Mary Pat Clarke and longtime neighbor and assessment appealer Kirsch Jones were EXCELLENT in sharing information about the assessment and appeal process and applying for the Homestead Tax Credit. We thank them for their generosity in sharing their knowledge and expertise.

Now that I think about it, there are a few other things I never thought I'd see in Charles Village, but did this winter!

- I never thought I'd see a million dollar home in Charles Village. Lo and behold, we have a million dollar baby right here on Calvert Street. Actually, it's a \$1.1 million dollar baby listed for sale by Brandywine Fine Properties, Sotheby's International Realty. This project will tell a great visual story, especially in Charles Village the hub of the project. There will be two Charles Village events. The first will open April 12 on the Johns Hopkins Homewood Campus Beach at 3400 North Charles Street, and the second will be a tree building installation in the lower lawn of Wyman Park Dell during the Charles Village Festival weekend, May 31 & June 1. In addition, North Charles Street to University Parkway will be lined with banners as part of the city-wide Urban Forest Project.

As a special end to the project, the banners will be recycled into tote bags and sold as original works of functional art. All proceeds from the project will benefit the Baltimore City Department of Recreation & Parks Tree Baltimore Campaign for a greener city and the goal of doubling the tree canopy to 40 percent in the next 30 years.

What is the best thing about Baltimore's Urban Forest Project? *It produces no waste!* The UFP is a grow-



ing global exhibition working in conjunction with the Times Square Alliance and World Studio Foundation in New York City.

Last fall, Charles Village-based Tilt Studio Foundation, Inc. discovered this project in NYC and is thrilled to bring it to their hometown. 






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Spaghetti Disco X— A Hit!





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Art on Purpose Maps Charles Village



Examine Legacy of Baltimore's 1968 Riots at University of Baltimore, April 3–5

The University of Baltimore (UB) announced the sessions and presenters who will participate in **Baltimore '68: Riots and Rebirth,** an unprecedented national conference in Baltimore from April 3–5 on the causes and effects of the 1968 riots. All of the conference events are open to the public, but registration is required. See the conference web page for an online sign-up and a link to the conference brochure.

On Thursday, April 3 at 6 p.m., at the UB Student Center's Performing Arts Theater, 21 West. Mt. Royal Avenue, the conference Baltimore '68: Riots and Rebirth will open with a plenary session Slavery, Jim Crow and the Death of a Dreamer: The Roots of a Riot, followed by a special screening of Pip & Zastrow, a film documentary most recently seen at the Sundance Film Festival- showcasing two lifelong friends, one white and one black, who helped quell racial tensions in nearby Annapolis during the same period in which Baltimore erupted.

Daily plenary sessions, followed by concurrent sessions on a wide variety of topics related to the civil unrest and its causes and results, will be held throughout the three-day conference. These gatherings will feature authors, students, musicians, professors, attorneys, advocates and witnesses to the disturbances. More than 100 people will be presenting during the three-day convening.

Jessica Elfenbein, coordinator of **Baltimore '68: Riots and Rebirth** and Associate Provost for University Engagement at UB, stated the purpose of the conference goes beyond a mere distillation of the history that was made in Baltimore in 1968. "One of the primary goals of the conference is to place the events of 40 years ago within a larger historical context to allow a deeper, more comprehensive understanding of where we have been and where we are going."

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Residential Permit Parking (RPP) for Area 37, Charles Village West DELAYED

At the March 12 Public Meeting, Theresa Webb and Gail Desch, City Parking Authority, reviewed the parking study for streets to be included in the new Charles Village West RPP Area 37. Howard Street committee representatives are still collecting signatures. If you would like to sign the petition on Howard Street, contact your block representative listed below.

Because of opposition to the new Area 37 RPP from businesses in the area, a Parking Management Study is now underway to satisfy the requirements of the City's RPP Ordinance, which requires the Parking Authority to assist businesses with finding alternative parking when an RPP is likely to have an adverse impact on the ability of businesses to park in the RPP Area. This study will take an additional 30–60 days to complete, but Ms. Webb and Ms. Desch promised to do it as quickly as possible.

As a result, the implementation of the Charles Village West RPP Area 37 will be delayed past April 1. Residents can and should continue to register online at http://baltimorecity.gov/government/parking/permits.html for permits. However, the permits will not be distributed until a few weeks before a new enforcement date is set. The new permit expiration date will be one year from the new enforcement date.


