CV Festival '13 Moves to West Side of Wyman Park Dell

The Village's ever-popular Festival '13 will rock on June 1 and 2— just one block west of its usual Charles Street site. All of the activities will be centered around the Howard Street side of Wyman Park Dell. The ongoing construction on North Charles Street has necessitated the move to the corner of 29th Street and Howard Avenue. Festival '13 will occupy the sweep that connects 29th Street to Wyman Park Drive and Art Museum Drive and the adjoining wooded parkland.

Key members of the Festival Committee have toured the site repeatedly and determined optimal locations for all of the perennially popular favorite activities during the two-day festival. "The new space will allow us to have more paved area and a better organized space for food and craft vendors," says John McLane, Festival Chair. The arts and crafts vendor tents, food trucks and community booths will be arranged similarly to their arrangement at the 29th and Charles Street site.

This year's festival location may be new, but its association with the landmark Wyman Park Dell is ongoing. Designed by the Olmsted Brothers as part of Greater Baltimore's comprehensive park system plan in 1904, the Dell connects the Charles Village and Remington neighborhoods.

Until this year, the Festival has fronted on the Charles Street side of the park. Each year, festivalgoers have seen marked improvements to the Dell. The Friends of Wyman park Dell continues to implement the Dell's 2007 Master Plan, beginning with the magnificent dry stone walls that define the lower lawn and pathways. The group has renovated the restroom building. Beginning in the summer, the playground will undergo major reconstruction to complement its site adjoining the Union Soldiers and Sailors Monument to attract more families.

Festival coordinators have increasingly incorporated the Dell's large lower lawn as a site for children's activities organized by the Village Learning Place. Fun and imaginative children's activities will expand in the lower Dell with a performance stage for music and a magician, hands-on crafts under the VLP tent, and of course, the Moon Bounce.

VLP Director Liesje Gantert is delighted that there will be "much easier access and better visibility" to the VLP's activities, since they will be more visible from the Festival food, vendors, and booths on the western side of the park. And the fun continues in the evening!" Lindsey Henley, the VLP's Volunteer & Community Relations Coordinator, encourages children of the 70s and 80s to an *Adultlescent Effort* marshmallow roast on Saturday evening.

Live music plays on! The music stage comes alive at 11 a.m. Saturday and continues until 9 p.m. and starts again at noon on Sunday until the Festival closes at 6 p.m. See the complete list of bands on page 3. Music Workshop's Jim Jones arranges for the bands and coordinates the music scheduling and comments, "The new Festival location will be a big plus for the bands, since the main music stage will back up to Wyman Park Drive, providing much easier access for the bands to bring in their equipment." Listeners can relax under the tall oaks along the park south of the Lee and Jackson Monument.

Always an important element to visitors' enjoyment of the Festival, the beer tent and beer garden will be in an improved location, too—next to the music listening area at the south end of the plateau. Beer Guy Bob Welch is anticipating much happier patrons since they won't have to leave the music stage listening area to quench their thirst. The many beer distributors, liquor stores and restaurants that donate the kegs of specialty and craft beers, cases of wine, and bottles of water expect that this year's new

Phase I Charles Street Reconstruction Allows Local Traffic Only

Beginning in mid/late April, Phase 1 of the Charles Street Reconstruction Project will be implemented.

TRAFFIC CHANGES

- ▶ North Charles Street, through traffic will be maintained from 25th Street to 28th Street.
- ► Charles Street from 28th Street to University Parkway will be open only to northbound local traffic and emergency vehicles.
- ► Throughout the duration of the project, businesses will remain open.
- ▶ Vehicles traveling northbound on Charles Street will be diverted at 28th Street to continue north on Calvert Street; southbound travelers will use St. Paul Street.
- ► East-west Streets will remain open throughout the project (including the connection between Art Museum Drive and 33rd Street), except for periodic weekend closures on Charles Street between 25th and 28th Streets.

PARKING CHANGES

This project will cause a decrease in unrestricted parking spots during construction.

- ▶ Parking spots will remain on Charles Street for local and business parking.
- Residential Parking Permits (RPP) will be maintained throughout construction.
- ► The majority of the parking during construction will be temporary back-in angle parking.

Rallying Support for Eddie's...

Johns Hopkins recently announced that the selection of a developer to propose a plan for the vacant lot Hopkins owns at Saint Paul and 33rd Streets. Not too long ago, Johns Hopkins officials informed Jerry Gordon, owner of Eddie's Market, that the developer is considering a grocery store as an anchor or "credit tenant." This alarmed Jerry because a grocery store at that location would put him out of business. He called several long-time Charles Village residents, including me, to see if we would be willing to advocate on behalf of Eddie's Market and against bringing in another grocery store. Everyone agreed to help. Jerry has been a loyal supporter of our neighborhood for many years and donates often to local causes. He employs 40 people. Many have worked there for years along with local teenagers and college kids. By sleeping on the floor if necessary, he always stays open during blizzards.

In the late 1990s, Jerry approached long time residents to ask how he might improve the store. He took much of the advice that was offered and made significant changes and improvements. How many storeowners would do that? On March 12, about 200 Charles Village residents attended a 90-minute presentation by Johns Hopkins and representatives of the developer. I was out of town and unable to attend, by all reports a majority of the folks at the meeting indicated they do not support bringing another grocery store to 33rd and Saint Paul and some oppose the concept of a credit tenant. Many ideas were proposed that night and at this time, it is not known whether the developer will go in another direction. Over 2,600 folks from the surrounding area have signed a petition in support of Eddie's.

I absolutely love walking into Eddie's and talking to the folks who work there. They ask about my son, Anders Hulleberg, who worked there while in high school and college. Jerry asks about my husband because he taught at the school that his daughters attended. Jerry's wife, Darlene Gordon, always asks about my family. I

feel this way when I go to Donna's and see Andy Thomas in the kitchen, or at Carma's when I see owners Carma Halterman or Michael Lynch behind the counter. Do I feel that way walking into **Starbucks?** Not a chance. Does it matter to me? Yes, because feeling a part of some place is important, and Eddie's and the people who work there make that connection possible. I would hate to lose that small town aspect of Charles Village, which would happen if Eddie's went out of business.

In February, Charles Village residents were stunned to learn that the team selected

by Johns Hopkins University to develop the lot at 33rd and St. Paul Streets is considering the installation of a supermarket chain on that site. Villagers **Dawna** Cobb and John Spurrier, who were among those who met with the original developers of the Olmsted site five years ago, recalled the clear understanding reached at that time. The community could support only development that would complement existing businesses in the 3100 block of St. Paul Street. In those original conversations Eddie's Market figured as integral to the vitality of Charles Village.

Incredulous that the university would abrogate that understanding, Dawna and John, joined by Ralph and Dana Moore, Odette Ramos, and Jo Ann Robinson, established the Friends of Eddie's Market Steering Committee (FOE), in consultation with Eddie's owners, Jerry Gordon and his wife Darlene, and Councilwoman Mary Pat Clarke. Within a short time the FOE committee expanded to include present and past principals of Barclay School, Jenny Heinbaugh and Gertrude Williams. The ranks were further augmented when the group welcomed Debra Evans and Joe Stewart, neighbors from Waverly where there is concern about the likely impact of another supermarket so near to the Waverly Giant.

FOE immediately requested an appointment with Johns Hopkins University President, Ronald Daniels. Word came back that his schedule could not accommodate a meeting. At the same time, the committee began a petition drive that has garnered over 2,600 signatures. In public and private meetings with university and developer representatives, FOE joined by large numbers of supporters, has pressed for the supermarket option to be removed from consideration. As JHU appears oblivious to such appeals, and as community tensions mount, Friends of Eddie's Market will continue this campaign to stop a supermarket in the 3200 block.

Knowing that all too often small businesses are shut down by large chains that sell plenty of groceries but care little about customers or community, FOE seeks not just to protect Eddie's, but also to protect the distinctive character of Charles Village. Locally owned businesses, merchants involved in the civic life of the neighborhood, caring service and dedication to the community are the bedrock of our -Jo Ann Robinson, Chair, Friends of Eddie's community life.

CVCBD FY2014 Financial Plan Hearing, April 23, 6:30 pm

The rescheduled Public Hearing on the CVCBD Financial Plan for FY 2014 will be held on Tuesday, April 23 from 6:30 to 8 pm on at Lovely Lane Methodist Church Hall, 2200 St Paul Street. The purpose of this meeting allows surcharge taxpayers the opportunity to review and comment on the proposed CVCBD Budget and Financial Plan for Fiscal Year 2013–14, beginning July 1.

CVCBD Patrol Officers Train on Trikkes

In February, six officers in the CVCBD Security Patrol program, received six hours of training in the use of the Trikke, a 3-wheeled vehicle used to patrol the District. Used by many security forces throughout the country, the Trikke is an all-terrain vehicle equipped with a siren, flashing lights and CVCBD security identifiers. The Trikke has a maximum speed of about 25 MPH and a special suspension system that enables the rider to make sharp fast turns.

As part of the training provided by Repforce, the officers – all off-duty police officers with the Baltimore Police Department — not only learned how to ride the vehicle safely but also dismounting and sudden stop techniques in addition to basic maintenance. The officers all received a certificate of completion. An additional four officers received Trikke training in March.



Volunteers will plant trees as artists prepare to install the sculptures, designed to honor the legacy of the former school students and staff. Step across the street and see poems by Alice and Phoebe Cary posted in the window of Grace Restoration Life Fellowship.

On St. Patrick's Day 2012, an historic marked was unveiled on Merryman Lane to preserve the history of this old country lane-- named after Lord Baltimore's 1688 land grant to Charles Merryman. His son John Merryman built a house and started a farm on an estate called Clover Hill, near today's Episcopal Cathedral. All that remains of the lane is this block from Greenmount Avenue to 33rd Street. The rest of the road is now known as University Parkway.

In 1889, on the triangle bounded by Brentwood Avenue and Merryman Lane, the Baltimore Public Schools Colored Division established School # 115. From 250 to as few as 123 African American pupils annually, attended grades one to six in three framed buildings on the site. When the school opened, the faculty included one of the first African-Americans to teach in the Baltimore City Public Schools, Roberta Sheridan. In April 1889, The Baltimore Sun reported that the principal and two teachers planted three trees at the new school. The trees were named for Harriet Beecher Stowe, Alice Cary and Phoebe Cary.

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

Shirley Brewer's Poetry Book Honors Slain JHU Researcher Stephen Pitcairn

Stephen B. Pitcairn, a 23-year-old Johns Hopkins University Researcher who aspired to be a doctor, was murdered on St. Paul Street on the night of July 25, 2010, as he walked home from Penn Station on return from a trip to New York to visit his sister. At the time, he was talking to his mother on his cell phone.

The week following Stephen's stabbing death, Shirley Brewer wrote a poem titled *Offering* and sent it to the Pitcairn family in Florida. The poem expressed the grief of the entire Charles Village community. His mother, Gwen, wrote a thank you note for the poem and began a correspondence that continues to this day.

Other poems followed. Shirley Brewer's book of poems, *After Words*, honoring the life of Stephen Pitcairn, has just been published by Apprentice House at Loyola University. Gwen Pitcairn wrote the *Dedication* of the book to her son. His Personal Essay— part of his application for medical school — is also included. There is information, as well, about the Stephen Pitcairn Scholarship Fund. The first scholarship was awarded last fall.

"Let *After Words* serve to honor Stephen B. Pitcairn, and the larger community of individuals whose lives have been cut short by knives, guns, and other weapons. Every death affects each of us," states Shirley.

Stephen Gewirtz reported, "Shirley attended the trial of John Wagner, who was convicted by a jury of the murder of Stephen Pitcairn with me. Her message is self explanatory, and I expect her poems to express very well the grief we in Charles Village still feel about the murder of a very promising breast cancer researcher and aspiring physician who lived in Charles Village."

Shirley J. Brewer, a Charles Village resident, is an educator and workshop facilitator. Her poetry has appeared in *The Cortland Review, Comstock Review, Passager, Free Lunch, Innisfree Poetry Journal, Pearl, Evening Street Review,* and other publications. Her poetry chapbook, *A Little Breast Music,* was published in 2008 by Passager Books (Baltimore). She currently serves as vice-president of the Maryland Writers' Association, Baltimore Chapter, and volunteers at WYPR, the Village Learning Place, and Hippodrome Theatre.


