At 20, CVCBD Moves Forward for 4th Reauthorization

The Charles Village Community Benefits District (CVCBD) turns 20 this year. Once again the CVCBD is up for reauthorization for four more years by the City Council. As a resident who went from opponent, to skeptic, to board member, to board president and booster, I want to bear witness to the contributions the CVCBD has made to the overall health of our community. The benefits district deserves to be reauthorized. The CVCBD offers a good return on a modest investment by residents and business people, representing about 3,400 properties.

When my wife, Jennifer Martin, and I purchased our home on the 2500 block of Guilford Avenue in 1991, we weren't sure how long we would stay in Baltimore. My wife was a graduate student at Hopkins, and I was working in DC, so we had chosen a block convenient to both Penn Station and JHU. We were drawn to the community by its location, great housing stock and its diverse and welcoming residents.

But our commitment to staying in Charles Village was tested those first few years. From day one, we knew all was not well. David Gordon, a 25-year old father of two employed at the Whitman-Requardt engineering firm, then located at 2315 St. Paul Street, was murdered in December 1990 in an armed robbery on the company's parking lot on Calvert Street just a couple blocks from us. Crime seemed out of control. Car break-ins were endemic. At night, we often heard gunshots. Picking up litter from the street seemed an endless task. An empty lot at the end of our block was so strewn with garbage—knee deep in couches, refrigerators, and trash of all kinds—that it seemed impossible to imagine that it could ever be reclaimed.

We had the advantage of a strong block with lots of long-term residents, both home owners and renters, who took their responsibilities seriously. But there was only so much we could do as volunteers without some sort of professional support.

In 1992, after a year of intensive community-based planning, the South Charles Village Partnership floated a proposal for a special taxing district to provide supplemental safety and sanitation services in south Charles Village. Because the area was a truly mixed residential and business area, the proposal called for the creation of a *Community Benefits District* to charge an annual property surcharge tax on both residential and commercial properties— a totally new concept.

I was frankly skeptical. Weren't we already paying for police protection and trash pick-up? Why should we pay more? And wouldn't the proposed district just push our problems next door? Would ordinary people even have a voice on the Board of Directors? Initial plans did not make provision for elected at-large representatives. It looked like only well-connected civic and business leaders would determine the budget and priorities of the new Management Authority.

Many of my neighbors shared my skepticism. Desperate as we were for help, we were not convinced that a special benefits district was the answer to what ailed Charles Village. When the initial proposal for the South Charles Village area expanded to include Charles Village up to 33rd *CVCBD Reauthorization, continued on page 9*



President's Letter

Hello Charles Villagers!

In the months ahead, the reauthorization process for the Charles Village Community Benefits District (CVCBD) takes place. I urge strong support for the City Council Bill #14-0324. Your personal letters of support will demonstrate the diverse range of CVCBD services and programs throughout the District to the City Council and Mayor.

Following is the CVCA Board's March 19 letter of support: The Charles Village Civic Association greatly appreciates and enthusiastically supports the dedicated work by the CVCBD. The District of Greater Charles Village is definitely cleaner, safer, greener and more attractive.

- ► The CVCBD Clean Team regularly cleans our streets and storm drains of leavers and debris, empties the 85 CVCBD trash receptacles as often as needed— some daily, removes bulk trash from the alleys as required.
- ► The CVCBD Safety Program expanded to include patrolling by armed Off-Duty Police Officers. With grant funding, the CVCBD installed 10 additional surveillance cameras to bring the total CVCBD area CitiWatch cameras to 50 for 24/7 surveillance. With CVCBD support, the volunteer-driven Neighborhood Walker patrols continue to expand crime prevention in coordination with the Community Safety Council of local security professionals.
- ► Increasingly, the CVCBD is seeking major grant funding and nonprofit agency contributions to leverage the \$674,607 (FY2013) in CVCBD surcharges paid by approximately 3,400 properties, whether residential or commercial, for the benefit of all in Greater Charles Village.

In the last four years, the CVCBD Management Authority has steadily made Greater Charles Village a better place to live, work, study and play. CVCA strongly urges the reauthorization of the Charles Village Community Benefits District City Council Bill #14-0324.

Festival Benefits CV Recreation League

In 1993, Ed Hargadon, Jim Casey and John Fink, started the Charles Village Recreation League (CVRL). They wanted their children to have recreational opportunities commonly found in the suburbs without having to leave the city, The three are also the founding fathers of the annual Charles Village Festival and the Community Foundation. CVRL benefits greatly from its annual partnership with the Charles Village Festival to support the league. CVRL volunteers organize the Fun Run and staff the water table for the 5K.

The Rec League is an all-volunteer organization that provides recreational sports for school-aged children and youth (ages 4 to 14) with an emphasis on fun, skills, teamwork and sportsmanship. CVRL currently offers clinic and travel soccer in both fall and spring along with futsal and a small basketball program in conjunction with the 33rd Street YMCA in the winter.

In 2013, 400 kids played for and with CVRL. The Spring 2014 CVRL Soccer Clinic for four-to-eight year olds filled up in two weeks. The program will be up

We also saw her frequently towing her grandchildren in what was probably the same wagon in which she pulled her son and daughter, Stefan and Kyra, in the 1970s. Her children and mine grew up together, with Kay organizing our infant play groups and taking the lead in establishing and administering the Red Wagon Child Care Center where so many Abell/Waverly kids were nurtured. Kay headed up the parent delegation from Red Wagon that descended on Barclay School with the message that we believed in public education and wanted to be part of the school community (which we soon were). A moving force in the Women's Liberation movement, labor organizing initiatives, youth sports coaching and untold undertakings for the betterment of children and youth, one of Kay's last endeavors was as Coordinator of the Baltimore chapter of the Gay, Lesbian, Straight Education Network (GLSEN), devoted to ending bullying and promoting the creation of safe environments for all young people."


Charles Village Easter Egg Hunt April 19 at Dell Playground



CVCBD Sanitation Services

Daily, the CVCBD maintains its 85 green trash cans at street corners throughout the District and also removes litter, leaves and other small debris by sweeping the sidewalks, gutters and alleys. Averaging 4,680 bags per month, the CVCBD removed and disposed of 224,648 bags of trash from the District from 2010 through 2013.

Bulk Trash Removal

The CVCBD picks up and disposes of bulk trash items such as tables, chairs, bureaus, and televisions. Averaging 130 items per month, the CVCBD removed 6,462 bulk trash items from 2010 through 2013.

Fall Leaf Removal Campaign

Each year during the Fall Leaf Removal Campaign, the CVCBD assists residents in the removal of leaves, removing 3,000–4,000 bags of leaves.

Rat Abatement Program

Since August 2012, CVCBD contracts with a local professional exterminating company to maintain 450 rat bait stations. Thousands of rats have died in their burrows and on private property as a result of this project. CVCBD staff have removed over 1,200 dead rats from alleys and other public areas.

Snow removal

Whenever it snows in Baltimore, CVCBD staff removes snow from around fire hydrants, bus stops, storm drains and clears pathways at street corners for pedestrians.

Reauthorizing Process Begins for CVCBD

By law every four years the Baltimore City Council is required to review the performance of the Charles Village Community Benefits District and to decide whether or not to reauthorize it for 4 more years of operation.

In February, the process began with by introducting City Council Bill #14-0324/ Charles Village Community Benefits District and Management Authority. The Council then referred the issue to the Baltimore Planning Commission and then the Urban Affairs and Aging Committee for public hearings on the CVCBD's performance in the last 4 years.

Residents are encouraged to write letters in advance of the public hearings and also testify. Both the Planning Commission and City Council Committee submit reports summarizing their finding to City Council. Finally, City Council votes on reauthorization. This legislative process will be completed by June.

CVCBD Safety Services

Safety Patrol Program

Started in September 2012, Safety Patrols provide an increased sense of security for residents. The CVCBD hires armed off-duty police officers with arrest powers who patrol three or four nights per week, targeting crime hot spots.

Neighborhood Walkers on Patrol

Neighborhood Walker Patrols engage residents in efforts to safeguard their community and promote a sense of personal well-being and neighbor responsibility. To this end, CVCBD trains and supports volunteer residents, property owners and business owners to walk regularly through their immediate area identifying and reporting suspicious activity along with unsafe and unsanitary conditions.

National Night out against Crime

National Night out against Crime is a nation-wide event in early August for lawabiding citizens to meet with like-minded citizens, show solidarity in opposition to criminal activities and learn ways to reduce crime in their community. CVCBD supports and organizes three or four NNOAC events in neighborhoods.

Surveillance Camera Project

The camera help spot crime and emergencies to direct police or emergency services immediately to the scene. The camera system produces high quality video recordings of illegal activities that can be used by the police and courts to identify and prosecute criminals. Currently, there are about 50 CitiWatch cameras in the Benefits District, including 10 purchased in 2013. CVCBD plans to install ten more video cameras in 2014. Baltimore CitiWatch monitors the cameras 24/7 and maintains them at no cost to the CVCBD.

Safety Advisory Council

In late 2010, the CVCBD reinstated the Safety Advisory Council (SAC) that consists of major stakeholders in the community concerned with safety. The CVCBD organizes and supports the SAC, which meets monthly to exchange information about recent criminal activity discuss ideas about how to improve safety..

Court Watch Program

Coordinated by CVCBD, the Court Watch program tracks cases involving defendants arrested for committing crimes in the area and influences court decisions by submitting Community Impact Letters (CIL) regarding the negative effect of the criminal activity. Working closely with the States Attorney's Office, as of December 2013, CVCBD has forwarded 227 CIL's to the courts.

CVCBD Special Projects

In addition to its regular safety, sanitation and outreach services, the CVCBD has been involved in many "special projects" during the past four years.

Since 2010, CSX has contracted with CVCBD for CVCBD to mow and edge the green spaces along the CSX fence line on 26th Street from Howard to Lock Raven. Community Garden at 23rd and Hunter

In 2011-2012 CVCBD staff helped to organize residents to convert a vacant lot at 23rd and Hunter Street into a community vegetable garden. The CVCBD recruited volunteers, identified a master gardener who designed the garden and oversaw the volunteers' work, wrote several successful grant applications to fund the project, trained volunteers, and organized several weekend work events.

Harwood 26'ers Sign

In 2012, CVCBD restored the Harwood 26ers sign located at 26th and Greenmount.

Vineyard Lane Reading Garden


Beginning in 2012, the CVCBD has assisted a group of volunteers. the Vineyard Lane Gardeners. writing grants and helping to organize work events.

Support for Community Events

CVCBD participates in and supports community events such as the Mayor's Fall and Spring Cleanups, the Abell Street Fair and the Charles Village Festival. The CVCBD always strive to improve our services to the community. We are proud of our accomplishments over the past four years—enhanced all of our programs and added a few that are very popular with residents.

CVCBD Finances

Revenue: Property owners within the Benefits District pay a tax surcharge of 12 cents per \$100 of assessed property value to help fund CVCBD services. CVCBD supplements this revenue primarily from grants, and a small amount of additional revenue from fee for service contracts and contributions. Over the past four years, revenue from grants has increased significantly as shown in the chart below.



Street and west to Howard Street plus the Harwood neighborhood and the Waverly business district, the Maryland General Assembly successfully enacted the enabling legislation in 1993.

So when the City Council established the CVCBD in 1994, my block mobilized to ensure that we would at least be represented on the board. We had successfully pushed for the creation of four "at large" representatives to the board, and I was elected to serve as Quad 1 representative in the CVCBD's inaugural year.

Once I joined the board, my skepticism began slowly to be replaced with grudging respect—respect for the hard work of the employees, and more importantly, respect for what the CVCBD might be able to accomplish by weaving together disparate blocks and interests into a more cohesive community. It was through my service on the board that I first became a more engaged resident of Charles Village, learning about the challenges faced by neighbors in Old Goucher, along Greenmount, on Abell Avenue, and on the west side blocks neighboring Remington and Hamden.

It turned out that the value of the CVCBD was not found only in the direct services its provided, but in the sense of community it forged and the political muscle it gave our neighborhood when engaging with the City of Baltimore, the Police Department, Johns Hopkins, recalcitrant absentee landlords, and other community stakeholders. United, we had a greater voice and more power.

Over the years the CVCBD has gone through several evolutions – from a heavy emphasis on security in the early years to a shift to economic development (the Main Street program, façade improvements, and filling vacant housing), and now to an emphasis on street beautification, bulk trash removal, and promotion. These changes have been orchestrated by all of us, because the CVCBD actually IS responsive to citizen input, and has been since its inception. It's not always been easy to find consensus, but over time the CVCBD has honed its mission and improved its accountability and effectiveness.

The results are obvious to me as long-term resident: cleaner and safer streets and alleys; fewer vacant properties, robust commercial blocks; new investment, and a stronger sense of community. That trash-strewn lot at the end of my block? Gone. Replaced by a green space. I smile every day when I walk by it, remembering the two enormous dumpsters we filled, the way the CVCBD lobbied the railroad to maintain its property, and can-do spirit that still animates my neighbors and the hardworking team at the benefits district. Let's keep it! -Frank Januzzi

St. Ambrose Opens Storefront Law Clinic

On March 13, attorneys from St. Ambrose Housing Aid Center began offering free 30 minute consultations at a walk-in legal clinic located at 108 East 25th Street, two blocks from the organization's main office. Jeanette Cole, Director of Legal Services at St. Ambrose, says the storefront clinic is an effort to reach out to more people by being visible on the street. This neighborhood is rich in resources and we need to be more proactive in making people aware of these resources.

While foreclosure prevention will be a major focus at the clinic, Cole says St. Ambrose is broadening its legal services. "We want to assist people with problems that can lead to foreclosure, such as consumer debt or poor credit. If someone is not receiving child support payments or having wages garnished to pay debts, they have a much harder time making the mortgage payment." The St. Ambrose Legal Clinic can help people resolve these housing issues.



Renters are also affected by whether they receive child support and other mandated benefits, says Gerard Joab, Executive Director of St. Ambrose. "Receiving all the income you're due means you're not forced to move from place to place, so your children can have stable schooling. It is not hard to connect access to legal advice with education as well as housing."

Last fall, St. Ambrose partnered with the University of Maryland Carey Law School's Just Advice program to conduct four one-day walk-in clinics at different sites. These clinics proved to be a good test run for the permanent clinic. There is still a huge demand for legal services that is not being met. There are not enough lawyers around to help people who can't afford lawyer fees.
