Charles Village— A Great Place for Living with Kids

It's no secret in our family that my parents, longtime suburban dwellers, want my husband, me and our two children to make the move to Baltimore County. Lower taxes. Safer streets. A yard. Better schools. You know the drill.

So I had to contain myself a few weeks ago when my mother, after a morning spent strolling with our 10-month-old all around Charles Village, said nonchalantly, "This really is a great place to have small kids."

I didn't want to make too big a deal of her concession....but, yes, I really did! Because the woman has seen the light! When I think about my life as the parent of two kids under two, I can't imagine living anywhere else but Charles Village. Sure, I get annoyed that there is nowhere to put our strollers except along the wall of our living room, a location now known as conveyance alley. Alas, the next day, everything came rolling back.

On those days, I grumble and groan. And then I take comfort in the many, many things that I love about having small kids in Charles Village.

I love taking my children for a walk in one of the aforementioned conveyances, stepping out of our door and basically choosing what kind of miniadventure we'll have. Will we head to the Barclay School playground, with its great little climbing wall, multiple slides, and swinging bridge? Will we browse for books at Barnes & Noble (and ride in the elevator, to my toddler's delight)? Will we stroll to the Abell Open Space, where I'm sure to see other parents and have some adult conversation? Will we pick up some things for dinner at Eddie's Market, stopping to look at various dogs/bikes/ flowers along the way— or, if the time is right, the moon and the hundreds of starlings roosting in the trees along Calvert Street? Will we get a burrito at Chipotle? Will we walk up to the Bufanoanimal sculptures near the gym on the Johns Hopkins campus? Or to the art museum? Or to Wyman Park Dell? 

Introducing Zipcar to Charles Village & **New CVCA Benefit**

On December 10, the Parking Authority of Baltimore City placed two new Zipcars on the south side of 33rd Street west of St. Paul Street in designated on-street parking spots. This was made possible through a partnership between Zipcar, the world's leading car sharing service, and the Parking Authority in an effort to decrease traffic, congestion and parking demands in the community. Zipcar has proven to decrease the number of personally owned vehicles in the communities where Zipcars are located.

National studies show that one Zipcar can remove 15 personally-owned vehicles from the road, as members tend to give up or hold off purchasing vehicles when they join the Zipcar network. Studies also highlight that Zipcar members walk, bicycle and use public transit more often and opt to reserve Zipcars when they really need a car or truck.

Representatives from Zipcar and the Parking Authority attended the CVCA General Meeting on December 1 to discuss how Zipcar works and to ask for the community's support for designating the new parking spaces for Zipcars.

Through this face-to-face meeting and email communications, CVCA President Jennifer Erickson received an over-**Zipcar,** continued on page 8

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

The e-mail provides information not only about the CVCA and its activities, but also includes the many and varied community events going on in and around Charles Village from activities in the Wyman Park Dell, to the Village Learning Place and our schools: Barclay & Margaret Brent. The CVCA also promotes our local businesses through CVCA membership and especially through those businesses that provide discounts to CVCA members.

CVCA's 2010 Highlight of Accomplishments

- ▶ New traffic calming measures. Removal of rush hour restrictions on St. Paul Street and on 28th Street from Howard to Charles, will provide traffic calming, safety improvements, and much needed additional parking for CV residents. In addition, streets with missing pedestrian crosswalks, walk/don't walk and one way signs, were reported and fixed.
- ► Zip Car in Charles Village with Discounts for CVCA Members. See page 1 for information.
- Many Land Use/Zoning issues Supporting new businesses such as Maxies and Ledo's. Working with property owners to promote quality of life and density control measures.
 - Planning continues with the City/DOT/25th Street Station Developers coordinated with our neighbor associations of Old Goucher Community Association (OGCA) and Greater Remington Improvement Association (GRIA) towards a more effectively designed, successful Planned Unit Design (PUD) project.
- ► Sponsoring the first Snowflake Tour of Charles Village Homes that attracted more than 100 folks touring our

- Ongoing communication outreach efforts including the new CVCA e-mail distribution list, *The Charles Villager* and CVCA website for community updates and information sharing.

2011 promises to be another year full of activity. CVCA needs YOU to help and volunteer for the community. Here is a sampling of volunteer opportunities:

- 1. Land Use & Zoning Committee. This committee meets monthly on the first Tuesday evening to review issues and requests related to planning, zoning, liquor laws, housing code violations and historic preservation in Greater Charles Village. Committee members attend City hearings to advocate on behalf of Charles Village, review City and State legislation affecting land use (i.e. live entertainment, group homes and comprehensive rezoning), meet with and discuss requests from applicants for changes in zoning (e.g. landlord requesting to increase the number of dwelling units in a building or transfer liquor licenses. Volunteers from a cross-section of the community bring varied perspectives and professional expertise to fully represent Charles Village's interests. The committee hears the requests, discusses the issues, and makes recommendations to the CVCA Board of Directors for support or opposition and then advocates to the appropriate City authority on behalf of the Charles Village community. This is a time consuming and important function and one that directly affects our quality of life as neighbors/residents.
- **Safety Committee.** This committee meets on an *ad hoc* basis to work for more effective safety in Charles Village. As a Safety Committee member, you could work closely with the Charles Village Community Benefits District (CVCBD). The committee also sends representatives to the Safety Advisory Council (SAC). SAC members include representatives from Johns Hopkins University, Northern Police District Neighborhood Services Division, Maryland State Department of Parole & Probation, Union Memorial Hospital Public Safety, Greater Homewood, and the Baltimore City State's Attorney's Office and CVCA. The SAC meets the first Wednesday of every month at 1pm in the CVCBD Conference Room. SAC advises and coordinates CVCBD safety efforts, which include the newly re-organized Court Watch program. If you are concerned about Charles Village Safety, become involved and join the CVCA Safety Committee.
- Charles Village Holiday House Tour Committee and the Charles Village Festival Committee. Both committees meet for months before the special event. Volunteers can get involved to whatever extent desired. To ensure these events continue to be successful, more volunteers are needed.

Again, please consider becoming involved or more involved in our wonderful Charles Village neighborhood. Visit www.charlesvillage.net for a listing of all the CVCA-related committees. 
championship on November

At that point I started to cry. Two years ago Anders broke his leg a week before the cross country season and last year he finished a disappointing 89th at this event (aka The Nationals). Through discipline and hard work— at some points in his training running twice a day for 90 miles a week— Anders ran the race of his life, making the Baltimore Sun, New York Times, CBS Sports and other media outlets. He became a minor celebrity on his college campus. It's a big accomplishment so I hope you will forgive me for touting my own kid's big win. And it all started many years ago when he ran and won the Charles Village Kids Fun Run during the Charles Village Festival!

Bicycle Boulevard— Baltimore City is working to expand and connect its bike lanes. Guilford Avenue will have

the first designated bike boulevard according to **Gary Letteron**, a Harwood resident and dedicated bicycle rider. In recent months, the community gave input into the proposed changes necessary to create the bicycle boulevard, extending from University Parkway to Mount Royal Avenue. Changes at Charles and 29th... You may have noticed the construction of the new roadway and sidewalks on W. 29th Street along the southern edge of Wyman Park Dell. This project removed the *sweep* going south on Charles to create a safer 90-degree right turn onto 29th Street. The old sweeping roadbed will be a vehicle free pathway that nicely enlarges the active parkland. This project leads up to the reconstruction of Charles Street from 29th Street to University Parkway, which will be underway later in the year. Court Watch Tracks Defendants

The Charles Village Court Watch program is designed to track a defendant accused of committing crimes in Charles Village as each case goes through the legal system from arrest to disposition and incarceration.

The program has three components:

- 1. Maintain a monthly "Court Watch" report and distribute this report to the community so that residents can be informed as to who has been arrested and the status of the defendant's court case.
- 2. Review active court cases and flag specific cases of special interest.
- 3. Influence the sentencing decision in specific court cases
 - A. Submit a Community Impact Letter to the prosecutor.
 - B. Assign community volunteers to attend active cases and sentencing hearings.

The CVCBD Safety Advisory Council (SAC) started the Court Watch last October. The SAC consists of representatives from the Abell, Charles Village, Harwood and Old Goucher community associations, Northern District Police Department, the State Attorney's Office, Parole and Probation, Johns Hopkins University, Union Memorial Hospital and CVCBD.

Stephen Gewirtz and Sharon Guida, both long-time residents of Charles Village, have volunteered to help implement the Court Watch program. Their support has been essential to the success of this program. Stephen and Sharon devote many hours of their personal time conducting research on defendants, writing Community Impact Letters, keeping the community informed about cases via e-mail, and attending meetings. Recently, a feature in *The Messenger* and Peter Hermann's column in *The Baltimore Sun* focused on the dedicated and persistent tracking and court work by Stephen Gewirtz. Steve is out front making our Court Watch program an ongoing success, while Sharon diligently writes the important community impact letters and coordinates communications.

The CVCBD SAC meets the first Wednesday of each month at the Benefits District office. Meetings are open to the public.

The monthly Court Watch Report is available online at www.charlesvillage.org. On the home page, click the *Reports* tab. As of February 4, SAC has submitted 42 Community Impact Letters to the Baltimore City State's Attorney Office regarding specific cases of interest and concern to the community.

whelmingly positive response from the community for the addition of Zipcars in Charles Village.

The two new Zipcars on 33rd Street are part of a growing fleet of on-street vehicles located throughout Baltimore City. Currently, 18 vehicles are located in parking garages and on surface lots at the Johns Hopkins Homewood Campus. Zipcars are also on the campuses of Towson University and Goucher College.

To become a Zipcar member, go to www.zipcar.com and enter your information. In a couple of days, you will receive your Zipcard membership in the mail. Then, you go online or call a toll-free number to make reservations— minutes in advance or up to a year ahead of time. At the time of your reservation next to a Zipcar, you hold your Zipcard over the scanner behind the driver's side windshield, and the doors automatically unlock. The keys are bolted to the dashboard with a zip cord. Drive wherever you need to go. Up to 180 miles, gas and insurance are included in the price of the reservation. Return the car to its home parking spot by the end of your reservation.

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DOT Designates Guilford Avenue as Safe for Bicycle Boulevard from Downtown

In other cities across the globe, bicycle boulevards have increased the number of cyclists by creating a safe corridor where beginner cyclists feel less intimidated.

Guilford Avenue is a commonly used bicycle route through the center of Baltimore from Downtown. Being a quiet residential street, cyclists are attracted to riding on Guilford Avenue with less vehicular traffic. The Public School Headquarters parking lot at North Avenue acts as a traffic diverter for all vehicles traveling north, but allows bikes to continue through.

Needing a connection in the city's bicycle network between the Collegetown Bicycle Network in north central Baltimore and Downtown, the Department of Transportation (DOT) will add improvements to Guilford Avenue between Mt. Royal and University Parkway. Guilford Avenue will be designated as a bicycle boulevard or roadway where bikes and cars share the road at near equal speeds. In the planning process, the DOT sought and received valuable community input to help determine what design treatments were appropriate for specific locations.

Design changes for the Guilford Avenue bicycle boulevard include:



Painted sharrows will mark Guilford Avenue.

- ► Adding sharrows along the length of Guilford Avenue from University Parkway to Mt. Royal Avenue, where the project meets Phase 2 of the Jones Falls Trail.
- ► Adding green sharrows on approaches to 33rd Street crossing and green bike lanes on the 33rd Street median crossing.
- ► Adding white pavement markings to delineate the on-street parking from travel lanes.
- ► Adding a Stop sign to 20th Street at Guilford Ave, just north of the Public Schools headquarters.
- ► Maintaining the 27th Street intersection as a 4-way Stop.



The Guilford Avenue bicycle boulevard will feature mini-circles as shown above to improve safety and security at the intersections of 22nd, 24th and 32nd Streets.

- ► Replacing 4-way stops at the intersections of Guilford Avenue with 22nd, 24th and 32nd Streets with mini-circles. Community input played a vital role in helping DOT determine where the mini-circles were needed to improve safety and security.
- Extending curbs on the southwest corner of North Avenue and Guilford to provide for better bike and pedestrian protection.
- ▶ Widening the median crossing at North Ave from 6 feet to 12 feet. While two separate crossings for pedestrians and bicycles were preferable, the location of signal poles prevented this option.
- ► Adding bike and emergency vehicle-friendly speed humps on the 2600 and 2700 blocks of Guilford Avenue.
- ▶ Adding wayfinding signs to indicate destination, distance and direction.

Once the project is complete, residents of Guilford Avenue will see little difference in the road as a whole—except for increased bike traffic. Where Guilford Avenue ties into Mt. Royal Avenue, this year Phase 2 of the Jones Falls Trail will be constructed, which will allow cyclists to continue onto the Inner Harbor. With other quiet residential streets across the city, Baltimore will likely see an expansion of the bicycle boulevard network in the future. Guilford Avenue will be the first!

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

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RENEWAL & PICK-UP for Residential Permit Parking RPP Area 37— Charles Village West

Residents of RPP Area 37 (unit and 100 blocks of West 26th Street, including unit block of East 26th Street, north to 29th Street, not including 28th Street; unit and 100 blocks of West 27th and 29th Streets, and 2600–2800 blocks of Maryland Avenue) must renew and/or register, purchase, and display their new annual parking permits and visitors passes for 2011 before March 31. Residents with handicap tags must also purchase RPP Permits. Residents with available off-street parking will not be permitted to purchase permits unless they prove that the number of cars registered to that address exceed the number of available off-street parking spaces.

February 15— First Day to renew RPP Area 37 online or downtown at the Parking Authority Offices; however, permit decals and visitor passes will not be available for pickup at the Parking Authority until March 20.

March 27— Community RPP Area 37 Pick-Up for new and renewal prepaid permit decals and visitors passes on the Front Porch, 2746 Maryland Avenue from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

April 1— City enforcement of 2011 Area 37 RPP decals and visitors passes begins.

Only residents who renew online or pay for a new permit with a credit card OR mail in a check or money order *prior to March 24* will be able to pick up their permits at 2746 Maryland Avenue on March 27. Residents need to bring current proper documentation and identification papers—vehicle registration, driver's license, current lease, non-resident permits, notarized letters, student or military ID, etc.

The RPP application site is htts://pabc.t2hosted.com/cmn/auth.aspx. Note: This is a different URL than what you used in previous years. The Parking Authority is using a new system to process payments for permits. For instructions on how to use the new website, go to www.charlesvillage.net. If you have any questions or concerns, contact the Parking Authority by e-mail at rpp@bcparking.com or by phone at 443.573.2800, extension 819 or 863.

COST: \$20 per year for a Resident Parking Permit Decal. Limit of 4 registered cars per household. \$20 per year for a Visitor Pass. Limit of 2 visitor passes per household.

Number of allowable households per property address to be determined by review of zoning records.

Note: A Parking Citation (fine) for not displaying a current RPP decal or pass in Area 37 is now \$52 for each occurrence.
