Festival '12 Garden Walk Highlights Bay-Wise Gardening

Before you mix up that chemical spray to attack a garden pest, take a moment to consider where that spray will end up. Most of us living in an urban environment with small green spaces surrounding our homes, feel very remote from the Chesapeake Bay. Mile-wise we are not close, but what we do here in Baltimore City has an impact on the health of the Bay.

The State of the Chesepeake Bay report card for 2012, which assesses water quality trends in the Bay, reflected a grade of D. This provides a greater challenge for all of us to do our part to leave the legacy of a cleaner Bay for our children. Most Maryland residents live within a half-mile of a storm drain, stream or river. Most of those waterways eventually drain into the Chesapeake Bay. What we do to maintain our own landscapes can affect the health of our local waterways—drainage ditches, streams, and rivers, the Chesapeake Bay and our environment. We all need to do our part to take care of our waterways and environment. By changing a few simple landscape practices, you and your family can help keep Maryland communities healthy.

Any rain and irrigation that runs off carries soil, debris, fertilizer and pesticides from your yard into neighborhood storm drains that lead to local streams, rivers, drinking water reservoirs and ultimately, the Bay. These substances can harm living organisms, habitats, and water quality. Reducing runoff from your property minimizes these problems. One easy way to do this is to keep grass clippings, fallen leaves and other yard waste out of storm drains, waterways and drainage areas. How often after a rain storm, have you passed a neighborhood storm drain clogged with trash?

The University of Maryland Extension, through its Master Gardeners Program, has developed a guide for best practices for homeowners to support a healthy Bay. The guide, known as the Bay-Wise Maryland Yardstick, includes 60 bay-friendly gardening practices. Master Gardeners, upon request, will make home visits to educate residents about the program and make recommendations, if indicated. When a homeowner complies with at least 36 of the criteria included in the Bay-Wise Yardstick, his or her garden is Bay-Wise certified. This is recognized with a small attractive sign that the resident can place in the yard to spread the word to neighbors about the program.

The criteria in the Bay-Wise Yardstick cover a broad range of landscaping practices including controlling stormwater runoff, mowing properly, watering efficiently, mindful use of fertilizers, managing yard pests and planting with a selection of native plants. Master Gardeners report that most people's yards are Bay-Wise certified at the time they make a site visit. When the site visit indicates the resident is not so ready, this gives Master Gardeners an opportunity to educate the public about simple affordable ways that they can contribute to restoring the health of the Bay.

Visit the Bay-wise Program Website, www.baywise.umd.edu and take the Bay-wise challenge. Assess your own garden. Learn

how you can make your urban garden more Bay-friendly by making a few simple changes in your garden practice. Learn to live with a few garden pests. Plant something native in your garden space, even in a container, to attract pollinators. Install a rain barrel and redirect the storm water back into your garden instead of the storm drain. Compost and reduce your contribution to the landfill.

Residents of Charles Village are beginning to have their yards Bay-Wise certified. Watch for the blue sign with the blue heron pictured above in your neighbors' front yards. Baltimore Streetcar Campaign Kicks Off

The Baltimore Streetcar Campaign, a grass roots organization is pushing to build a world class streetcar system in Baltimore. People understand and recognize that great cities need great transit. Our goal is to build public support for bringing the streetcar back—making Baltimore a more livable 21st century city. As the initial project, we favor building a wireless fixed-rail streetcar along the Charles Street corridor connecting the Inner Harbor to Johns Hopkins University.

The Charles Street Corridor Streetcar will demonstrate how a dynamic mix of new transit will enhance the livability and economic health of Baltimore by connecting the diverse, architecturally stunning, history-rich communities and activities along its route. Of the 60-plus streetcar projects in development today, the Charles Street line was called "one of the best opportunities in the U.S. for the streetcar to revitalize historic neighborhoods and link them to the city's landmark institutions..." by the head of the U.S. Congressional Livable Communities Task Force.

Economic impact studies of streetcars in place for more than a decade in cities like Portland, **Baltimore Streetcar,** continued on page 3

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

White House Selects Northern District Police Commander for Domestic Violence Workshop

On May 15, Major Sabrina Tapp-Harper, commander of Baltimore's Northern Police District served as a law enforcement representative for the Obama Administration's effort to reauthorize the Violence Against Women Act. Vice President Joe Biden praised law enforcement for their efforts to combat domestic violence. White House Advisor on Violence Against Women, Lynn Rosenthal, Attorney General Eric Holder, Senior White House Advisor Valerie Jarrett, and Ms. Sharon Love, mother of Yeardley Love and founder of the One Love Foundation, were also present to speak about the need to reauthorize the law.

The Violence Against Women Act was originally drafted by then-Senator Joe Biden and signed into law in 1994, and was reauthorized by Congress in both 2000 and 2005. The law has allocated more than \$9 billion to improve federal, state, and local-level investigation and prosecution of domestic violence, rape and sexual assault and to provide support for prevention, education, temporary shelters, rape crisis centers and community services for survivors.

Abell Foundation Awards \$133,800 to CVCBD for Surveillance Cameras

CVCBD has received a grant of \$133,800 from the Abell Foundation to implement a Public Safety Surveillance Project for the Great Charles Village Area. The project involves installing 12 state of the art night vision surveillance cameras in designated high crime areas to supplement existing CitiWatch cameras in the District.

Working in cooperation with CitiWatch, the Northern District Police Department and Johns Hopkins University, CVCBD's 12 new public area cameras will be monitored 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and will provide *real time* video that will meet court standards for evidence. The project goals include:

- ► Assist police in apprehending suspects as they commit crimes
- ► Assist police in preventing serious crimes as criminal activity develops
- ▶ Improve timely recognition of emergency response needs for crime victims
- ► Increase the likelihood of apprehending suspects and successfully prosecuting defendants for crimes they have committed
- ► Improve public safety by discouraging robberies, assaults, burglaries, larceny and other crimes

The Coordinator of the CVCBD's Community Safety Program will oversee the project as an in-kind contribution of approximately \$4,000. CitiWatch will install the cameras and provide staff to monitor the cameras 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The financial value of this in-kind contribution has not been determined; but is substantial. The 12 public area cameras funded by the Abell Foundation will be installed sometime at the end of June or early July.


The CVCBD's original proposal to the Abell Foundation included a resident property owner component for an additional \$55,800. The CVCBD will seek other funding for this component for the installation of 40 surveillance systems on the property of selected individual property owners in targeted locations not covered by public area cameras—giving residents the opportunity to take a proactive part in improving neighborhood security. This component would provide targeted surveillance in areas that have experienced criminal activity at a comparatively lower cost of \$1,415 per package, plus \$480 for installation. Each of the 40 resident-property owners will be required to contribute \$500 toward the purchase and installation of the camera system at their property. —David Hill, CVCBD Executive Director

CV Community Foundation Awards CVCBD \$913 to Establish a Tools Bank

The Charles Village Community Foundation awarded \$913 to establish a Tools Bank for residents in the Charles Village, Harwood, Abell and Old Goucher communities. The establishment of this bank is part of the CVCBD's ongoing effort to encourage and support community greening projects throughout the area.

The tools will include rakes, brooms, shovels, gloves, dust pans, an assortment of heavier equipment such as wheel barrows, brick hammers, hand trucks, hedge shears, hoes, pruners, sledge hammers, spades (round, drain and square head), step ladders, and axes. Residents will check out the tools for short periods of time to help complete their neighborhood greening and beautification projects. We expect the tools bank to be operational by early June.

Support CVCBD's FY 2013 Budget and Surcharge Rate of 12.5 Cents!

Please send your letters or e-mails of support for the CVCBD's proposed FY 2013 Budget and Surcharge Rate! At its Public Hearing on CVCBD's Financial Plan, March 27, the Board of Directors recommended the adoption of a budget of \$814,130 for Fiscal Year 2013. The Financial Plan includes a proposal to raise the surcharge tax rate from 12 cents to 12.5 cents per \$100 of assessed value of residential and commercial properties in the District subject to the surcharge tax.

Before adoption, the Baltimore City Board of Estimates must review and approve the proposed plan. The date of the Board of Estimates hearing has not been set but is usually held the first week of June. It is essential that the Board of Estimates knows that the community supports this financial plan. 
Rat Abatement Program Will Continue

Because the Rat Abatement Program has proven to be so successful and popular with residents, in April, the CVCBD Board agreed to continue the program in FY 2013.

Last August, the CVCBD District contracted with Regional Pest Management to manage the extermination part of our Rat Abatement Project—the other two parts are education and enforcement. RPM deployed 460 rat bait stations in the public areas (mostly in the alleys) throughout the 100 square blocks of the Charles Village Community Benefits District. RPM monitors and replaces damaged rat bait stations, redeploys stations if underused, and re-bait as needed.

The results have been very positive. Although we do not have scientific data that the rat population has abated, we do have a lot of anecdotal evidence. First, almost every resident comment so far has been positive about the program. CVCBD has received numerous e-mails and phone calls. People have stopped staff in the street to thank the CVCBD for this effort. Second, in the past nine months of the project, CVCBD staff has collected and disposed of almost 700 dead rats. In addition, residents have told CVCBD staff that they too have disposed of dead rats from their yards and side alleys; and RPM has found some dead in the bait stations. We are certain many more die in their burrows or elsewhere.

Although we are not likely to get rid of all the rats in the District, we do hope that we can reduce the population to a tolerable level and keep it there. —David Hill

JHU's Homewood Community Partners Initiative Summary

Successful neighborhoods that are healthy, safe and resilient! This is the shared vision of the Homewood Community Partners Initiative (HCPI), a collaboration among the Johns Hopkins University and the neighborhoods surrounding the Homewood campus. In September 2009, incoming JHU President Ron Daniels said, "Our ideas, our energies, our passion and optimism can contribute so much to the community of which we are part. How we galvanize our intellectual and moral strengths for the betterment of our community, and for the betterment of ourselves, stands as yet another compelling challenge that we must address."

The HCPI grows out of that commitment and a growing understanding that the health and well-being of JHU is inextricably tied to the physical, social and economic well-being of its surrounding neighborhoods. Universities across the country have embraced their role as *anchor institutions*, working closely with neighborhood leaders to strengthen the communities in which their campuses are deeply rooted. The key to successful university-neighborhood engagements lies in transparency, open communication, collaboration with community partners, and the recognition of shared values.

In August 2010, JHU's Board of Trustees created the External Affairs and Community Engagement Committee, the first new standing committee in 13 years. Established to oversee new community engagement efforts, the committee endorsed the HCPI as its first action. The HCPI looks to substantially strengthen 12 neighborhoods and commercial districts based upon a community-university collaborative approach. We have started the process with participation by the civic organizations from within the HCPI— Abell, Barclay, Charles North, Charles Village, Greenmount West, Harwood, Oakenshawe, Old Goucher, Remington, Wyman Park and Waverly Main Street, as well as associated organizations including the Greater Homewood Community Corporation, Village Parents, CVCBD, Old Goucher Business Alliance, North Charles Village PUD and others.

JHU set up an internal implementation team to oversee the selection of the HCPI consultant and provide early feedback. Project Consultant, Joe McNeely, *JHU Community Partners*, continued on page 10



led a highly interactive and transparent process that enabled the stakeholders (JHU, residents, and others vested within the HCPI area) to find common ground and a sense of shared ownership of the HCPI strategy and recommendations. This process involved over 100 meetings with local stakeholders, including neighborhood associations, nonprofits, businesses, foundations, city council members and municipal staff, as well as leadership at JHU.

An advisory committee, comprised of 17 community leaders from throughout the HCPI area and five JHU administrators, met four times and a substantially larger group— also representing the full HCPI area— gathered an additional two times, with both groups reviewing the HCPI strategy and recommendations and providing input on its contents. From the information received at these six meetings, as well as many additional discussions with HCPI stakeholders, Joe McNeely has produced and delivered a draft report to JHU. This report will be reviewed by university leadership, and JHU will respond to the recommendations during the summer

A sample of the HCPI recommendations includes:

- ► Create and brand a partnership with local public schools within the HCPI area
- ► Create a development fund to provide gap financing on transformational real estate projects that are consistent with neighborhood plans
- ► Acquire and hold onto nuisance properties in a Land Bank for redevelopment in the future
- ► Extend the Purple Line Circulator to Charles Village
- ▶ Partner with Healthy Neighborhoods to expand their successful programs to the entire HCPI area

During the summer, JHU will work with community leadership and other anchor institutions to identify priorities and discuss the transition to an implementation phase. It will be these points of shared interest among the community and university that will serve as the action items for the HCPI and the associated collaborations among the vested parties. 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

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


