Trees are the ultimate living art installation— now's your chance to become a part of our growing tree canopy in Baltimore!

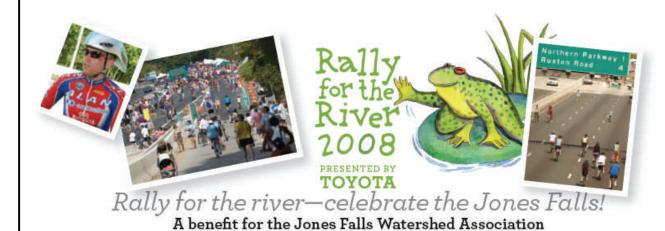
The Urban Forest Project is seeking 200+ participants on Saturday, May 31 at the Festival. Between Noon and 3:30 pm, participants will pick up dots next to the Friends of Wyman Dell booth and also in the lower Dell where the Nourish Sculpture & Performance will take place under the direction of E. Rachael Baird and Jessica M. Pegorsch. Participants will receive a name tag and a circle and will be tasked with collecting names of people that are pledging to live more sustainably. We are asking that each dot have at least 5 names— showing a 1,000



people that have pledged. At 4 pm all participants will convene in the lower lawn of The Dell and have the Tree Ceremony, positioning the dots around the brown branch structure (see logo above). This will create the larger tree canopy. The dots will remain in place until 5 pm, when the community is invited to take them away.

In 2006, Tilt Studio Foundation encountered the Urban Forest Project (UFP), and decided to bring this innovative visual arts project to Baltimore to help raise awareness about the importance of the eco-system in our urban environment. The Urban Forest Project was originally conceived in New York City by the World Studio Foundation and Times Square Alliance. The Baltimore: The Urban Forest Project experience brings together over 350 local artists, designers, businesses, and students from kindergarten to college committed to the sustainability of Baltimore's trees. At the project's conclusion in June, each banners will be re-purposed into functional, one-of-a-kind tote bags, continuing the cycle of sustainable production. All proceeds benefit TreeBaltimore— whose goal is to double the tree canopy of the city as a part of Mayor Dixon's Greener Baltimore initiative. Through June 28, public events and exhibitions are planned to engage the Baltimore community and raise awareness of urbanenvironmental concerns. —Rachael Baird, Tilt Studios

#### VLP Summer Program for K through 8

**Summer Programs**— *Monday, June 23 through Friday, August 1* This summer the VLP will offer 6 weeks of free programming for Kindergarten through 8th Grade students. Free lunch provided. Applications can be picked up at the circulation desk of the VLP Library.

#### **Number Playground Math Program & Enrichment Classes**

K-5th Grades: Monday-Friday, 9 am to 3 pm\* 6th—8th: Monday-Thursday, Noon-4 pm \*WAITLIST ONLY FOR K-5th!

#### **Creative Writing Workshop**

This workshop consists of a four week session of creative writing with instruction in fiction, poetry, playwriting, and literature workshops. Over the course of the weeks, writing teachers will help students develop ideas, write, edit, and complete final drafts of fiction, poetry, and/or dramatic scripts. Final written pieces will be compiled in an anthology with copies for the students to take home.

#### Art Around the World

Students will be creating art inspired by different countries from around the world. Each week we will look at a different culture through art, food and music. Students will experience some of the traditions connected with the art of that culture.

#### **Gigabytes**

Students will visit the computer lab on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. Typical student days will be independent in nature facilitated by the instructor. These students will continue their mastery of software, creative writing, music production, and graphic art.

#### **MIME (Music Interpreted thru Movement and Expression)**

The popularity of mime has increased over the past decade. Mime is an interpre-

tive dance form that has grown beyond the traditional concept. Through this class, students will use their bodies, particularly their hands and facial expressions, to portray the emotions of the music we enjoy. The VLP mime team will encourage positive expression through drama and dance.

#### **Ngoma Martial Dance**

Ngoma incorporates the martial arts of Bando and Capoerira, as well as boxing, hip-hop, yoga, and physical training drills. Participants will practice boxing drills with gloves and equipment, learn choreographed dances and martial arts forms, engage in slow focused yogic movements and complete obstacle courses as well as participate in team competitions and sports.

#### Spanish for Everyday Use

Learn the basics of everyday conversation such as exchanging common greetings, introductions and contract information, and describing family and daily life. Topics include learning vocabulary by practicing dialogues for typical conversation.

#### **Sports Health**

Students will participate in off-site field trips to provide experiences and information about health and wellness education. Participants will experience personal training sessions with a certified trainer, swimming, as well as consultations with naturopath doctors.

#### **Step Dance**

Step is a form of dance made popular by many fraternities and sororities. Step creates beats and rhythms through physical movement, adding inspiration with words. The VLP's step team will do just that, encouraging physical fitness and positive expression through this unique performance art.

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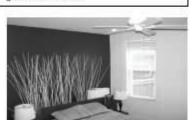

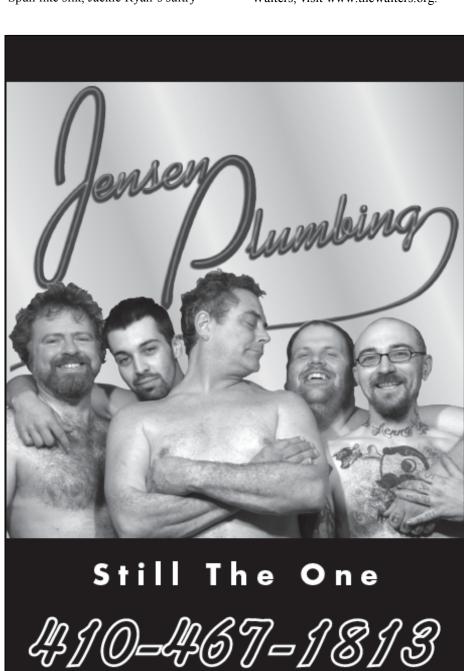

#### St. Ambrose Housing Aid Center Celebrates 40 Years

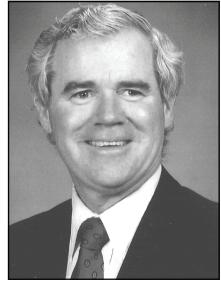
St. Ambrose Housing Aid Center is a well-known, nonprofit housing agency—located for 30 years in the 300 block of E. 25<sup>th</sup> Street. Vinnie Quayle, a former Abell Avenue resident, and his staff have been addressing the housing needs of Baltimore residents for 40 years. More than 100,000 people in our city have personal, often heartwarming, St. Ambrose stories.

Over the decades, St. Ambrose has combated unfair and discriminatory housing practices such as redlining and blockbusting. The agency's five core programs are like an urban 5-H club:

- 1. Home Owning
- 2. Home Renting
- 3. Home Building
- 4. Homesharing
- 5. Home Keeping

For over 20 years, St. Ambrose has renovated houses, replaced roofs and furnaces, and administered the deferred loan program for elderly and low income homeowners. Focused on increasing homeownership opportunities for residents in the Harwood and Barclay neighborhoods, the homeownership counseling programs allow access to many of the grant programs available for first time homebuyers in the city. Johns Hopkins' Live Near Your Work Program is just one example.

The renovation program morphed into full-scale housing development. Buying vacant and abandoned properties throughout the city, doing quality rehabs on the houses and reselling them to homeowners, St. Ambrose helped to stabilize neighborhoods in Belair-Edison and Northwood. There is a St. Ambrose *Work-in-Progress* in Charles

Village at 2625 Guilford Avenue. Watch for this lovely renovation to be available soon.

Assuring that quality, affordable rentals are available in the City continues to be a large part of St. Ambrose's mission. St. Ambrose owns and manages 55 units of affordable housing in the Charles Village area. These scattered site units are just part of the 330 units in the St. Ambrose portfolio.

Over 31 years ago, Frank Fischer and Joe Delclos started doing default mortgage counseling. That department is called Foreclosure Prevention and is busier than ever—receiving calls from across Maryland and handling over 2,000 clients last year. The St. Ambrose Homesharing pro-

gram, the only one in Maryland, has matched over 1,000 homeowners with over 1,000 suitable tenants in its 18 years of operation.

Along with the programs and services St. Ambrose provides, members of the staff have long and colorful histories in the Baltimore community. Early mentors Sampson Green and Walter Carter of the Activists, Inc. influenced the young founders of St. Ambrose. Frank and Vinnie were formerly known as Father, as in the white collar variety. Vinnie had strong ties to the infamous Berrigan Brothers of the Catonsville 9 and remains closely connected to the Jonah Peace Project in West Baltimore. Frank Fischer was a professor at Loyola High School in the turbulent

#### **Street Tree Requests**

The Baltimore City Forestry Division is pleased to plant street trees on the street right-of-way at the request or approval of property owners.

In order to assure that the trees are planted in locations that promote tree vigor, minimize safety hazards and conflicts with sidewalks, and also to assure they are routinely watered, applicants are asked to comply with procedures for one of two situations:

- ► Trees planted in an existing planting location
- ► Trees planted where there is currently a concrete sidewalk with no tree pit

Be patient! Trees are living things, and so coordinating the inspection, ordering, and planting of your tree to insure its health and vigor takes time and is influenced by the seasons. With the proper planting and care, you will enjoy your tree for many years to come! Depending on when the request is received and the schedule for ordering and planting, your tree may be planted anywhere from four to ten months from the time of your initial request.

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#### **GHCC & JH Center on Aging Share Award**

Greater Homewood Community Corporation (GHCC) and the Johns Hopkins Center on Aging and Health (COAH) were recently honored with a Bridge Builders Award from Partners for Livable Communities. The award recognized the successful partnership between GHCC and COAH in developing the Experience Corps program, which matches volunteer mentors over age 55 with elementary school students in 20 schools across Baltimore.

Annually, Partners for Livable Communities, an organization based in Washington, D.C., recognizes collaborations like GHCC and COAH for the positive impact they have on their communities. "Baltimore's 'town-gown' alliance has provided a new model for how committed groups can come together to improve the quality of life for all citizens, both young and old," praised Partners for Livable Communities President Robert McNulty in a statement. GHCC and COAH received the award at an April 10 ceremony in Washington, D.C.

A nationwide program, Experience Corps in Baltimore has quickly become renowned for its quality and for important contributions to research on older Americans. Experience Corps began in GHCC's six partnership elementary schools: Margaret Brent, Medfield Heights, Barclay, Guilford, Waverly, and Dallas F. Nicholas. After five years in these schools, data indicated that Experience Corps worked wonders for both students and senior volunteers. In the 2007-2008 school year, Experience Corps was present in 20 elementary schools in Baltimore, engaging 373 volunteers. Students with a mentor through Experience Corps have higher

test scores and fewer disciplinary problems. And their mentors have an opportunity to share wisdom learned over their lifetimes.

"The unique gift of Experience Corps is that by benefiting the children, the adults benefit themselves as well. And the students, by receiving what the adults are anxious to give them, also benefit," says Sylvia McGill, GHCC's Director of Public Education Programs and Experience Corps. "It is truly a new senior program for a new generation of seniors who choose to remain active and involved in the community around them."

As further testament to the importance of Experience Corps in Baltimore, Mayor Sheila Dixon recently incorporated the program into City budget funds set aside for youth programming.

Other honorees included former governors Christine Todd Whitman and Parris Glendening for creating the Governors' Institute on Community Design; Enterprise; the National Arbor Day Foundation; the U.S. Forest Service for an initiative to plant one million trees per year for 50 years; and California assemblyman Fabian Nuñez and California governor Arnold Schwarzenegger for their bipartisan environmental work.

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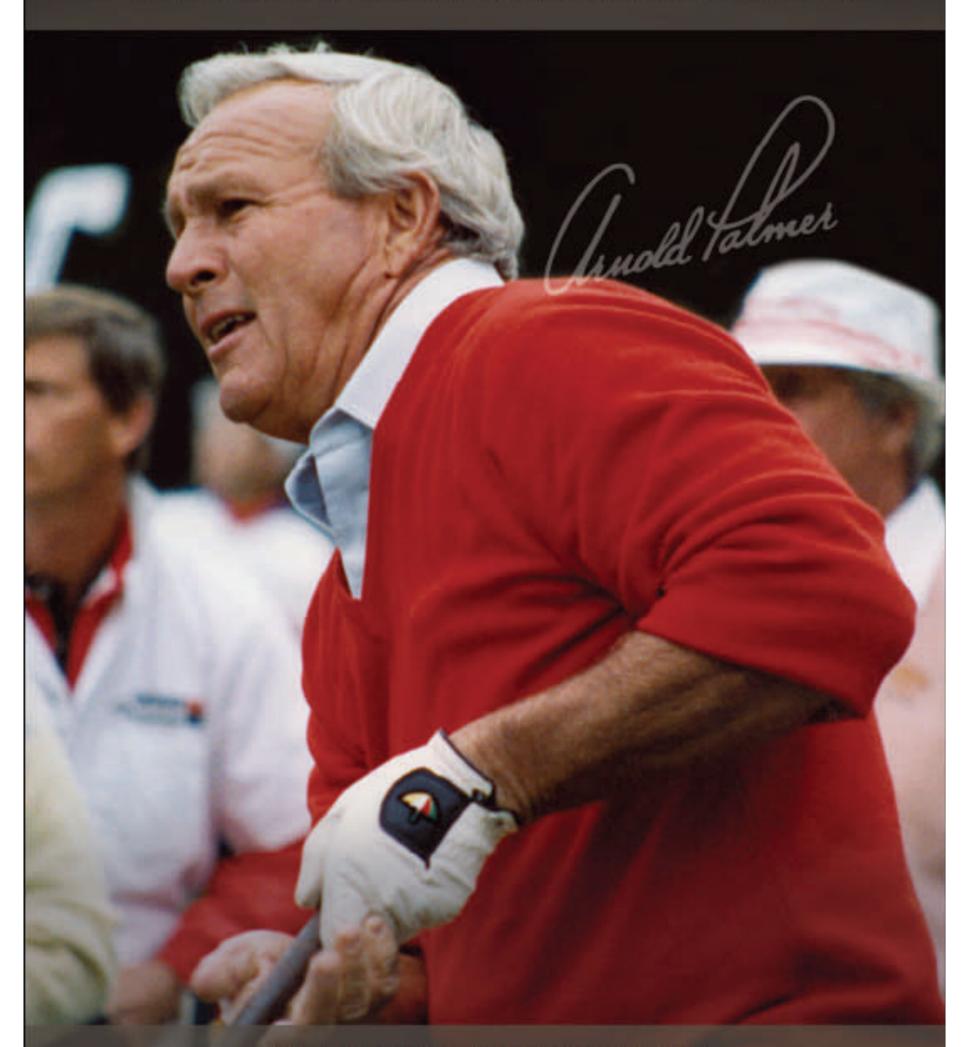
